

# Mad Lib instructions

- 1) Start by reading the story or paragraph that contains the blank spaces, also known as "prompts."
- 2) Look at the type of word or phrase that is being asked for in each blank space, such as a noun, verb, adjective, or adverb.
- 3) Ask a friend to think of a word or phrase that fits the type of word being asked for in the blank space. For example, if the prompt is asking for a noun, they could answer the word "dog" or "book".
- 4) Write down the word or phrase your friend have chosen in the blank space provided.
- 5) Repeat the process for each blank space in the story or paragraph until all the prompts have been filled in.
- 6) Once you have filled in all the prompts, read the story or paragraph out loud to see how your words have changed the meaning of the story.

Have fun and get creative with your answers! Mad Libs are meant to be silly and playful, so feel free to choose funny or unusual words and phrases.

<b>Noun</b>	A noun is a word that names a person, place, thing, or idea. For example, "cat," "teacher," and "school" are all nouns.
<b>Pronoun</b>	A pronoun is a word that takes the place of a noun. Instead of saying "Mary went to the store," you could say "She went to the store," using "she" as the pronoun to replace "Mary."
<b>Verb</b>	A verb is a word that describes an action or a state of being. For example, "run," "jump," and "is" are all verbs.
<b>Adjective</b>	An adjective is a word that describes a noun or pronoun, giving more information about it. For example, "blue," "happy," and "tall" are all adjectives.
<b>Adverb</b>	An adverb is a word that describes a verb, adjective, or other adverb, giving more information about it. For example, "quickly," "very," and "carefully" are all adverbs.
<b>Exclamation</b>	An exclamation is a word or phrase used to express strong emotion or surprise. For example, "Wow!" and "Yikes!" are both exclamations.
